On February 20, 2018, Tennessee Renewable **Energy & Economic Development Council** (TREEDC) mayors from Southeast Tennessee hosted a brown bag lunch in Chattanooga to recognize TREEDC'S 10TH year anniversary of connecting communities to renewable energy. **TREEDC President/Dunlap Mayor Dwain Land** thanked Governor Bredesen for giving TREEDC the impetus to start renewable energy back in 2008. During 2008, the State of Tennessee had embarked on statewide programs for solar, biofuels and energy efficiency. As a result, four (4) rural Tennessee Mayors and Former University of Tennessee President Dr. Joe Johnson and the Municipal Technical Advisory Service (MTAS) formed TREEDC.

Today, TREEDC has 108 mayors who are working together to create a path to fast track renewable energy in Tennessee. Thanks to lower costs in solar, more availability of compressed natural gas and more sophisticated energy capital, more rural communities are engaging in development of renewable energy facilities. Tennessee Advanced Energy Business Council Holds Successful Annual Meeting

Tennessee Advanced Energy Business Council (TAEBC) wrapped up another successful Annual Meeting in Nashville thanks to the support of Bridgestone Americas. Attendees heard from featured guest Scott Becker, Senior Vice President of Administration and Finance for Nissan North America. His presentation focused on Nissan's contribution to Tennessee's advanced energy economy providing good-paying jobs for Tennesseans and the growth the company has experienced since its original decision to locate to Tennessee. He also discussed Nissan's corporate vision striving for Zero Emissions through its electric vehicles and Zero Fatalities through its autonomous drive technologies, all leading back to the Nissan LEAF.

Members also had the opportunity to hear from TAEBC's newest board members in a panel moderated by Vice President Cortney Piper. Trish Starkey with Schneider Electric, Marc Gibson with UT, and Chris Bowles with Bradley were all formally appointed to serve on TAEBC's board. The newest board members were asked a variety of questions including what their thoughts were on Tennessee's current advanced energy economy, outlooks for the future, and what areas within the state's advanced energy ecosystem they felt could use improvement.

On April 12 -13, 2018, TREEDC members participated in the Leadership WestStar Program for Energy/Technology. This leadership session for West Tennessee governmental and business leaders was designed to give attendees an overall glimpse of how energy is produced and transported and the importance of alternative energies.

TREEDC Vice President Pat Riley organized a tour of the Gibson County Energy Complex which features compressed natural gas stations which are in part fueled by a solar array. The University of Tennessee MTAS Management Consultant/TREEDC Director Warren Nevad discussed recent energy developments in West Tennessee and gave a historical perspective of the growth in renewable energy in Tennessee since 2008.

The WestStar mission is to identify, encourage and equip community-minded people who want to become more involved, who want to help West Tennessee become a better place, and who are willing to accept assertive and dynamic leadership roles. Participants learn new leadership skills and develop strategies for assisting communities in solving problems and maximizing potential. Participants also become part of a growing network of other leaders who through mutual support and assistance shape the future of West Tennessee. WestStar is committed to advancing the regional and global community through outreach and community/public service endeavors.

TREEDC Member Knoxville Implements LED Streetlights Program

The City of Knoxville has installed new LED streetlights at selected pilot locations in the city. The pilot locations have been serving as testbeds to be evaluated by the City, public stakeholders, and for residents to also get the chance to experience the new LEDs in action.

Since late last year, Knoxville has been gradually flipping the switch to energy-efficient lighting in several neighborhoods through these design and testing phases.

Knoxville selected TREEDC member Siemens to retrofit nearly 30,000 streetlights. The retrofit will cut the City's streetlight operation budget in half by \$2 million annually in energy and maintenance costs. With these savings, the investment is expected to pay for itself in less than ten years.

These new streetlights will be 50% more energy efficient and help the City achieve its goal of reducing municipal greenhouse gas emissions 20% by 2020. Once the design and testing phase is complete, Siemens expects to begin installation of the new lights across the city later this vear. All work is expected to wrap up by Summer 2019.
