The National Renewable Energy Laboratory recently issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) to award up to \$11 million for projects that focus on: (1) reducing the cost of natural gas vehicles; (2) increasing vehicle efficiency; and (3) advancing innovative medium- and heavy-duty natural gas engine designs. Projects selected through this solicitation will complement Vehicle Technologies Office research started in FY 2017 to improve the performance, reliability, durability, cost-effectiveness, and efficiency of natural gas vehicles. Cost-effectively achieving diesel-like efficiency in natural gas engines, while meeting emissions standards, will improve the viability of natural gas fueled medium- and heavy-duty vehicles.
