On August 28th, the Tennessee Renewable Energy & Economic Development Council (TREEDC) held its 15th Anniversary Celebration in TREEDC President Dwain Land's hometown of Dunlap Tennessee. Back in 2008, Former University of Tennessee President Dr. Joe Johnson, Municipal Technical Advisory Service (MTAS) and mayors from Crossville, Gainesboro, Graysville and Pikeville formed TREEDC, a statewide organization of 108 city and county mayors promoting and connecting economic development with clean energy and energy efficiency. Today, TREEDC is poised to assist local governments with funding assistance with the implementation of the Inflation Reduction Act, Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and other clean energy programs administered by the state and federal government.

















Inflation Reduction Act Provides \$369 Billion in Tax Credits and Direct Pay Options for Local Govnerments

The Inflation Reduction Act's (IRA) "elective pay" (often called "direct pay") provisions will allow tax-exempt and government entities for the first time to be able to receive a payment equal to the full value of tax credits for building qualifying clean energy projects. This could be game changing for local governments who were not previously eligible for tax credits because of the tax-exempt status. The Direct pay option is a mechanism that allows an entity to claim a tax credit as a rebate, this direct pay option is a part of the IRA for tax-exempt entities such as cities, counties, public schools, universities and rural cooperatives, providing these entities a new tool to fund clean energy projects. Qualifying technologies include solar, geothermal, electric vehicles, battery-generators, energy storage systems, and combined heat and power cogeneration. Tennessee Flood Ready Partners with TREEDC with Protect Tennessee Coalition



TREEDC Member Tennessee Flood Ready Tennessee announced in September the launch of Protect Tennessee, a statewide effort to promote resilience against all natural hazards. The new coalition builds upon Flood Ready Tennessee's commitment to ensuring every county in the state is equipped with the necessary resources to prepare for flooding disasters.

Natural disasters cost Tennesseans millions of dollars, and in the worst cases, their lives. The need for statewide resilience planning and engagement has never been more critical. According to the Tennessee Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations (TACIR), natural disasters will continue to cost Tennesseans over \$500 million annually. Wildfires alone cost Tennessee taxpayers over \$4 million every year. Protect Tennessee aims to bring together experts and local leaders to ensure they have the resources, strategies, and tools they need to protect Tennesseans from the impact of natural disasters.

"The decision to extend our efforts shows that we are dedicated to keeping our communities safe from a multitude of risks, not just floods," said Dwain Land, President of the Tennessee Renewable Energy and Economic Development Council (TREEDC) and a member of Protect Tennessee. "Floods are still a significant concern, but we know that Tennessee needs a more comprehensive approach that addresses threats like wildfires, tornadoes, and earthquakes. We want to make sure that every community has the information and strategies to protect their residents and infrastructure."

Protect Tennessee will continue to work closely with its 150 coalition members from 67 counties to support resilience efforts by the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency and other state departments. By fostering partnerships at the community level, Protect Tennessee hopes to ensure that cities and counties are getting the resources and attention that they need to mitigate the damage caused by natural hazards.

"As the former Mayor of Dunlap, TN, I've seen firsthand the damage that floods, tornadoes, and other disasters can cause," Land said. "These types of disasters can and will happen again. We must ensure that all communities in Tennessee have ability to withstand disasters and bounce back quickly."

As part of its expanded focus, Protect Tennessee unveiled a new website, ProtectTN.com, featuring resources on resilience tailored to the specific challenges posed by different natural disasters. The coalition will host roundtables and gather advisory groups to raise awareness of the need to support resilience planning.

Protect Tennessee, formerly known as Flood Ready Tennessee, is a coalition of local elected officials, experts, and citizens advocating for increased investments in resilience planning. Over the past two years, the coalition was focused on flood mitigation and now is looking to ensure that all communities have access to the resources they need to mitigate the effects of natural disasters. In Memoriam: UT-CTAS Consultant Frank McKee

This TREEDC Newsletter is dedicated to the memory of Frank McKee. Frank passed away on July 29, 2023. Ironically, Frank was born in the same year as Former UT President/TREEDC Chairman Dr. Joe Johnson and the Tennessee Valley Authority: 1933. Frank's middle name was Delano the same as President Franklin Delano Roosevelt who was President of the United States when TVA started in 1933. My father (Richard Nevad, Sr.) was also born in 1933. That year apparently was a very momentous year.

Frank was a constant wealth of information during TREEDC's formidable years and was always eager to give our TREEDC mayors sound advice in renewable energy. Frank was a wonderful ambassador for the University of Tennessee. Frank retired as a County Government Consultant with the University of Tennessee County Technical Assistance Service. Frank graduated from the University of Tennessee with a master's degree in planning and was an avid University of Tennessee sports fan throughout his life. He was a United States Army Veteran, serving from 1953 to 1962. During his service, he was assigned to US Army OM Europe-Occupation Germany and was stationed at the Head Quarters U.S. Army QM Mortuary System in Frankfort, Germany.

His life was dedicated to public service, which is reflected in numerous recognitions bestowed upon him. Some of those include Dedicated Service Award 1993-94 Tennessee River Valley Association, 1993 University of Tennessee Award of Merit for dedicated service, 1993 U.T. Institute for Public Service Award of Excellence, 2005 U.T Institute for Public Service Team Commitment Award for Economic Development Initiative and the 2007 Maynard Pate Regional Leadership Award presented by the Greater Nashville Regional Council. Earlier this year, as he approached his 90th birthday, he was honored once again. This time, it was a Joint Resolution of the Tennessee Senate and House of Representatives which acknowledges a lifetime of service to his beloved state of Tennessee through his successful efforts to better its cities and counties for improving the lives of all its citizens. Thank you, Frank, for your guidance and thoughtfulness to everyone who had the pleasure of working with you. Rest in Peace, Frank.
